It would be hard to find a group of adults more serendipitously isolated from contact with strangers than the Millennials.In 1979, two years before the oldest Millennials were born, the disappearance of 6-year-old Etan Patz while he walked to a school bus stop by himself gave rise to the popular parenting philosophy that children should be taught never to talk to strangers. By the time the first crop of stranger danger children was in middle and high school, caller ID and automated customer service had made it easy to avoid talking to strangers on the phone. Seamless and food-delivery apps like it, which make most of the interactions with strangers from ordering takeaways from restaurants, emerged in the mid-2000s. (Today, Seamless entices new customers in New York City with ads in subway cars that emphasize that by using the service, you get restaurant-quality meals without talking to anyone.) Smartphones, introduced in the late 2000s, helped fill the bored, aimless downtime or waiting times that might prompt strangers to strike up a conversation. And in 2013, when the oldest Millennials were in their early 30s, Tinder became available to smartphone users everywhere. Sudden dates too (or sex, or phone sex) can be set up without as much as a single spoken word between two people who had never met. In the years since, app dating has reached such a level of ubiquity that a couples therapist in New York told me last year that he doesn't even bother asking couples below a certain age limit how they met. (It's almost always the apps, he said.) Millennials, in other words, have enjoyed unprecedented freedom to refrain from live or personal interactions, especially with people they don't know, and have often used it. And less chatting with strangers means less flirting with strangers. The stranger-free dating world that Millennials have created provides the backdrop for a new book titled, revealing, *The Offline Dating Method*. In it, social skills coach Camille Virginia, who works with private clients and also runs workshops, tries to teach young people how to get data, not by browsing the apps, but by talking out loud with strangers in real life. The Offline Dating Method bills itself as a guide for single women on how to attract a great guy into the real world, unlike on Tinder, Bumble, Hinge, or any of the other countless dating apps on the market. On the surface level, you might say, it's a guide to being asked out Sex and the City-style (i.e., by attractive and friendly strangers who take their approaches everywhere and everywhere), sometimes veering into some of the same questionable gender-essentialist territory the HBO show often trod. For example, Virginias warns its female reader against simply asking a man by himself if he's not making a move, and advises readers to ask attractive questions for information or directions, because men love to feel helpful. It would be easy to mistake some tips from The Offline Dating Method for tips from a self-help book about finding love in an earlier decade, when people were idle and more approachable in public, their energy and attention directed not into the palms of their hands, but outwardly, to other people. The first of the three chapters of the guide is all about how to be more approachable, and suggestions include wearing interesting jewelry or accessories that invite a conversation, and keeping the mouth slightly open to eliminate resting bitch face. (One of the book's first opinions, however—to just go to places you find interesting and make it a point to deal with your surroundings-struck me as both timeless and newly poignant.) The Offline Dating method also gestures only fleetingly to what some might argue is one of the main deterrents against flirting with strangers in 2019: the fact that it is sometimes seen as, or can quickly degenerate to, sexual harassment. But later parts of the book mark it as a hyper-present artifact of the present—of a time when social-media skills are often merged with social skills, and when the simple question of what to say out loud to another person can be fear-inducing for many. In the second and third chapters, *The Offline Dating Method* could virtually double as a guide to how to talk and to get to know strangers, full stop. Virginia advises readers to start conversations with others by simply pointing out what's happening within their shared landscape rather than opening with a joke or a canned pickup line; she reminds readers that it is good to think of some interactions with strangers as just practice for others that will be more important, as a way of lowering the stakes and the inherent stress. She even recommends chatting naturally by broadcasting livestreams on Instagram or Twitter: It's impossible to fake your social skills when you're live; you're forced to go with the flow even if you stumble or lose your train of thought, she writes. It's the opposite of, say, spending 30 minutes over-crafting a two-sentence text message. Virginia also gently guides the reader through the basics of having an interesting conversation, on a date or in an environment, advocating for depth and not breadth (i.e., asking a series of questions on the same topic, rather than skipping around to varied aspects of the other person's life) and offering a list of seven signs that a conversation has come to its natural end. (Six: The other person starts fidgeting or looking around.) The existence of a book like *The Offline Dating* can be used as evidence that smartphones and the Internet have caused arrested social development for the generations that grow up with them. And perhaps it is true that on average, previous generations of people, who regularly interacted with strangers and made small talk to pass by time while waiting for trains and elevators, would be less in need of such a guide. To some extent, Virginia recognizes so much in the book: Today, she writes, people crave ... connection and authenticity. Every day, people are inundated with an overwhelming amount of information and distraction, most with the only motivation to hijack their time and/or money. So when a modern person meets someone who is able to engage them on a deeper level and sans ulterior motives, all their unmet need for connection will probably come pouring in. So be ready, because it can happen quickly. On the other hand, the existence of a book like Virginia's also points to a desire to transcend some of the antisocial tendencies of everyday life and dating in the Internet age. And to her credit, she offers plenty of concrete ways to do this without sacrificing the great things that smartphones and wireless Internet access have made possible. For the reader who is sensitive to wearing AirPods to listen to podcasts or stream music in public, for example, she recommends just keeping headphones out, to see what opportunities are starting to open up. The slogan of the site, find equal for you, controversy has drawn from some segments of the Christian community for seeming to imply divine power. 2. Coffee Meets Bagel Good things comes for those who wait. At least that's the premise of this niche dating app. Users are offered one match every day at noon a bagel) with whom they probably share mutual friends on Facebook. They have 24 hours to select or succeed. If both sides choose each other, they get an ice breaker question (like Which bars do you bookmark on Yelp? and What's your favorite late night snack?) to get the ball rolling. The app is aimed at urban young professionals- NYU, Columbia, and the University of Pennsylvania are the most popular alma maters. 3. Only farmers As the slogan of the site says, city people just don't get it. The app is designed for single farmers (as its name would suggest), but also ranchers and really any eligible bachelors and bachelorettes in rural America. Users can upload photos, fill in short essay sections, and chat with others living in the country. 4. Grindr What's better than gaydar? Grindr. I don't know what to do. This location-centric app provides users with a grid of men looking for men who are available (and online). The real-time aspects of the app can quickly become addictive: users spend an average of 90 minutes a day on Grindr. The app is designed to make it easier to connect, but users have the option to select that they are looking for everything from now to networking (really?). 5. Grouper First dates can be tricky, so why not bring friends? (We promise we won't be talking about some kind of blind-date threesome.) Grouper is an app that pairs three single friends with another trio that shares some of the same interests. Grouper selects the bar and claims to pay for the first round. But considering your fork over \$20 to go on the date, it's not exactly on the house. Throughout the date, Grouper texts a series of dares, which function as a form of group bonding and can be anything from staging a fake breakup to taking a selfie with a stranger. And while the app doesn't ask you to take the couple out, isn't that more or less inevitable if the night wears on?6. Hinge If you are the type of person who likes to vet potential suitors for the first date, Hinge is the app for you. The app only offers potential matches with whom you share mutual friends on Facebook. There's even a questions button, which allows users to send a quick message to mutual friends to ask if they think this mystery date would be a good match. And setting up couldn't be easier, because there is no profile to fill in. Instead, users get questions about their Facebook friends, such as Who would be your boss one day? and Who adopts a stray puppy? These answers lead to personality traits (such as being optimistic and comical) being added to your profile. Fortunately, the properties are all positive, so you keep those skeletons in the closet for now.7. HowAboutWe Billed as the offline dating site, is built on the assumption that you tell more about people by what they want to do than how they respond to personal essay questions. New users are prompted by the simple phrase what about we and asked to propose a date idea. Users are emailed a daily list of potential agreements about shared interests (and date ideas). Asking a partner out on a first date is so much easier if you already know if they are more likely to go bungee jumping or drinking at the local bar. 8. JDate If you have a bubble asking when you're getting married, this is the perfect site to find your partner. The dating service is aimed at Jews, but allows users to select religious beliefs on a spectrum from culturally Jewish to Orthodox. Like Match.com, JDate has a highly paid subscriber base. This site plays on tongue-in-cheek humor with the slogan get chosen and read a banner, find someone who still loves sleepaway camp on JDate TV, the dating site YouTube channel. 9. iSwipe If Tinder and JDate had a love child, it would be iSwipe. The service hit the app store in the middle of Passover this year, and like Tinder, just requires you to swipe right if you're interested and swipe left to pass. When you get a match, light up the screen with the words Mazel tov! and chair-lifting stick figures dancing Horah. A few glasses of Manischewitz is all the liquid courage you need to start chatting. 10. Lovelifter More often than not, we are quick to judge a book by the cover or in this case a dating profile in the main photo. The founders of Lovelifter, who bill it as the app where quirky people meet, believe in the power of words. When you open the app and look for possible matches, you'll notice that their faces are blurry. Instead, your focus is focused on a 140-character message. When you and an adoring potential suitor woo each other with humor and poeiticly, you get a mutual match and you finally get to see each other's faces. Oh, and did we mention that Lovelifter will send location-based first date recommendations? This is really Zoogy Deschanel in dating app form. 11. Match.com This service has been kicking around for more than two decades-first as newspaper ads, then as a website, and ultimately as an app. With 1.9 million paid subscribers, Match.com remains one of the few holdouts that still manages to succeed with an income model. Users simply set up profiles with open-ended essay sections, and hope for the best.12. OkCupid If this app was in high school, it would be captain of the mathletes. Users answer questions, the average person answers 350 to determine their personal preferences, attributes, and what they're looking for in a match. Then, an advanced algorithm (the site was founded by four math majors at Harvard, after all) tells users their percentage match other users. It also has a Tinder-esque feature where users can rank potential partners and receive notifications if they mutually receive 4 or 5 stars (which in Tinder terms they swipe to the right).13. OneGoodLove When it comes to finding a dating app that isn't aimed at connecting, gay men seem to have the deck stacked against them. That's why a former business developer at Match.com launched OneGoodLove, an LGBTQ dating site that aims to foster long-term relationships. The focuses on the quality of connections over the quantity of competitors. 14. Plenty of Fish POF is one of the oldest (launched in 1999) and the largest (70 million users worldwide) dating sites out there. Users answer questions as part of the service's chemistry predictor, which measures things like self-confidence, self-control and convenience. Then, a mathematical algorithm churns out potential suitors, giving you better chances at a good match. Chances are you've seen product placements for POF in music videos like Britney Spears's Hold It Against Me and Lady Gaga's Phone. 15. Reveal! Have a sultry voice that woors shake in their boots? Then Reveal! is the app for you. Users record a 20-second message and members swipe through the audio recordings of potential matches in a Tinder-like way. If both parties agree, they'll see each other's profile picture and start chatting. We feel like Barry White would have done well on an app like this. 16. Siren What if we flipped the switch on centuries of courtship and said that women should take the first step? That idea is the motivation behind Siren, a new app that makes the concept of the Sadie Hawkins dance a reality. Users answer one question a day in an attempt to show their authentic self, at least more authentic than you would get from the typical 'about me' section. Sample questions include: What is a hidden gem in Seattle? And what did you want to be when you were a kid? Women choose who they want to chat with based on the answers of potential suitors. 17. Tinder This app is tailor-made for the limited attention span of 20-somethings. Users are served an endless buffet of eligible bachelors and bachelors. Swipe right on a photo if you're interested and swipe left to pass. If both sides swipe right, a match is created, and only then can you start chatting. (Say goodbye to unrequited love.) The creators of Tinder have cleverly changed this act of swiping into a game. When a match is created, users have the option to send a message or keep playing. It seems we forgot to listen to the backstreet boys' plea in the band's infamous balled, balled.

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
